A skilled and compassionate neurosurgeon, gifted researcher and extraordinary academic leader, Dr. James T. Rutka has made a lasting impact on health care in Canada and around the world.

For more than four decades, Jim Rutka has helped shape the field of neurosurgery as we know it today. His groundbreaking work and commitment to surgical innovation have helped transform treatments for paediatric brain tumours, and he is recognized the world over for his development of pioneering interventions for children living with epilepsy.


Today, Jim's work in novel human brain tumour cell lines is used as a model by scientists around the globe — with his lab being one of the first to explore revolutionary techniques for the delivery of cancer drugs through the blood-brain barrier.

His distinguished body of work has also been marked by a passion for global health. Jim has been a tireless champion of addressing lingering inequities in neurosurgery delivery in countries such as Brazil and Ukraine, calling these efforts the 'most gratifying and fulfilling' experience of his career. They also led him to establish the Global Surgery Program within the University of Toronto's Department of Surgery. And it is here, at U of T, that Jim has perhaps had the greatest impact. A graduate of U of T's Neurosurgery Training Program, Jim was first appointed as a faculty member in the Division of Neurosurgery in 1990. He would later go on to serve as the division's Dan Family Chair from 1999 to 2011, and as the R.S. McLaughlin Professor and Chair of the Department of Surgery from 2011 to today.


